The Alfond Inn at Rollins College FL celebrated the completion of its \$40 million expansion

Winter Park, FL, Dec 1st, 2023. The Alfond Inn at Rollins College celebrated the completion of its \$40 million expansion with a November 15 press event that featured tours of a new 4-story wing. The expansion broadens the boutique hotel's offerings with upgrades that include: A 30,000-square-foot wellness spa with seven treatment rooms. A 2,000-square-foot fitness center, A 1,650-square-foot flexible event space and a 700-square-foot meeting room, Pool deck with private cabanas, A cafe offering coffee and lite bites. 71 new guest rooms that bring the hotel total to 183.

History; The city of Winter Park, FL was discovered by Mr. Loring Chase, a Chicago businessman who at the urging of his doctor, wintered in the warm climate of Florida. While there, he toured the central part of the state and saw the land that would become Winter Park. Though lightly populated at the time,

Mr. Chase saw its potential and with a boyhood friend, Oliver Chapman, puchased 600 acres of land for \$13,000.

With the establishment of Rollins College in 1885 and the convenience of easy transportation with a railway running through the heart of town, the community thrived. From the start, Park Avenue was the pulse of The commercial center and Rollins developed its campus along the shore of Lake Virginia. The small town,

which was marketed throughout the Northeast by Chase and Chapman, quickly gained popularity as an arts and literary colony. Early in the 20th century northern investors sparked a Florida land boom that spurred the community to invest in brick streets, new schools and growing subdivisions.

From Depression to Development: Growth came to a sudden halt in the late 1920s and remained stagnant through the Great Depression. The late 1930s brought a rebound in economic development to Winter Park and growth since the 1950s has altered the landscape of the town considerably as it has continued to meet the needs of rising popularity. Despite the change, the community does retain a number of buildings from its early years.

Today Winter Park retains its reputation for art and literature and visitors can enjoy many great reflections of this past with visits to the Rollins Museum of Art, the Polasek Museum and the Morse Museum of American Art. Strolling down the brick walks of Park Avenue and beyond also recall the community's rich historic roots.

News from the builder Balfour Beatty: Balfour Beatty has completed the \$36 million expansion and renovation of The Alfond Inn at Rollins on behalf of Rollins College in Winter Park, Fla. The hotel's five-story, 81,000-square-foot addition is a vital development to the area's social venue spaces, which complements the award-winning Alfond Inn, the centerpiece of the community and premier space for socializing, local events, meetings and weddings. The building expansion adjacent to the existing luxury hotel includes 71 new guest rooms, a communal café in the lobby, a spa with an amenity deck, a second swimming pool and an additional 2,400-square-foot meeting, boardroom and event space. The hotel's new wing features a four-story atrium and leverages natural light to provide continuity and a seamless transition

from the existing space to new areas. The 112 existing guestrooms were renovated and modernized.

The boutique hotel is owned and operated by Rollins College, which directs net operating income to fund student scholarships. Since 2013, the hotel has funded millions of dollars in scholarships to Rollins College students and the expansion extends the hotel's capacity to do so in the future. In addition, the AAA four-diamond hotel is home to The Alfond Collection of Contemporary Art, which displays art from the Rollins Museum of Art throughout the hotel. The expansion project also provides new public spaces where additional artwork can be displayed.

"Building successful hospitality projects such as the renovation and expansion of The Alfond Inn rests on the expertise of our teammates and quality industry partners," John Harris, Balfour Beatty executive vice president, said in a statement. "Balfour Beatty's hospitality experts delivered another marquee project that will serve as an essential asset for Rollins College, our Central Florida community and the many guests who visit our region."

Balfour Beatty leveraged the latest technologies and lean construction methods to deliver the project while The Alfond Inn at Rollins was opened and operating. The project team used collaborative construction management software to unify and streamline access to project information; Building Information Modeling technology to coordinate project details and sequence the work; and pull planning to maximize value and minimize waste.

Baker Barrios Architects was the project architect, and the interior design was a collaboration between Baskverill and Sheedy/DeLaRosa Interiors. The project team was led by Olympia Development.

Managed by Olympia Hotel Management, The Alfond Inn at Rollins is located 15 minutes from downtown Orlando and 30 minutes from Walt Disney World and Orlando International Airport.

FEB 1

Legendary rock singer Ozzy Osbourne announced his retirement from touring.

The 74-year-old had faced health complications for years, including a spine injury and a diagnosis of Parkinson's disease. After a number of canceled shows, he made the hard decision to quit touring to take care of his health.

FEB 6

MAR 9

MAR 14

MAR 17

The International Criminal Court issued an arrest warrant against Russian President Vladimir Putin.

The warrant was issued for the crime of forcefully deporting children from Russian-occupied parts of Ukraine into Russia. A warrant for the same crime was also issued against Russia's Commissioner for Children's Rights.

APR 29

Legendary country musician Willie Nelson held a two-day music concert for his 90th birthday party.

MAY 1

Geoffrey Hinton, the "Godfather of AI," resigned from Google amidst growing concerns over AI.

The so-called godfather, who gained his nickname for his pioneering work in the AI field, resigned to help spread the word about the dangers of the emerging technology.

MAY 2

The Writers Guild of America went on strike after a labor dispute.

MAY 4

JUN 8

JUN 30

Harrison returned to our screens for "Indiana Jones and the Dial of Destiny."

JUL 8

Elton John ended his touring career with a final concert in Stockholm, Sweden.

JUL 21

Greta Gerwig's Barbie and Christopher Nolan's Oppenheimer opened in cinemas.

JUL 22

Good Vibes Festival was canceled after The 1975's lead singer kissed his bandmate on stage in protest of Malaysia's anti-LGBTQIA+ laws.

Malaysia is a Muslim-majority country where homosexual activity is criminalized. Matty Healy, an ally of the LGBTQ+ community, kissed bassist Ross MacDonald to make a point and criticized the government's stance on the matter.

JUL 26

Niger President Mohamed Bazoum was removed from office by a military coup.

This made the fifth coup in Niger since it gained independence from France in 1960. The coup was condemned by many of the world's foremost institutions and political bodies, including the World Bank, the United Nations, and the African Union. AUG 10

Two rival driverless taxi companies were given approval to operate 24/7 in San Francisco, California.

The two companies, Cruise and Waymo, had been testing their services in the city for a year before they were given full approval. AUG 19

Russia's Luna 25 lunar lander mission crash-landed on the Moon.

The mission was Roscosmos' (Russia's space agency) first attempt to send a spacecraft to the moon. The last Russian attempts occurred in the 70s under the Soviet space program.

AUG 23

India became the fourth nation to successfully land a spacecraft on the Moon.

The decision came soon after Wenner released a book titled "The Masters," in which he exclusively interviewed white male musicians, and the magazine's board of directors removed Wenner from the list following racist and sexist remarks he made regarding why he didn't feature any female or Black artists.

SEP 27

The Writers Guild of America strike against the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers ended.

The 148-day strike was the second-longest strike the Writers Guild had ever undertaken. Writers took to picket lines to demand better pay and benefits while also seeking to safeguard their jobs from potential replacement by AI chatbots like ChatGPT.

OCT 5

Research into fossil footprints at White Sands National Park in New Mexico confirmed humans were in the Americas at least 21,000

years ago.

According to former theories, the Americas was only populated about 15,000 years ago via the Bering Strait between modern-day Russia and Alaska. The new research used multiple methods to determine the footprints' age, with all results pointing to a date between 21,000 and 23,000 years ago.

OCT 8

Israel formally declared war on Hamas following a surprise attack by Hamas operatives in Israeli-controlled territory.

At the point of the declaration, the death toll had already risen to 1,100 from both sides.

OCT 13
